#### **Becoming a Twinner**

If you are reading this article then I hope you are interested in joining the Yate Twinning Association who are linked with the beautiful German town of Bad Salzdetfurth which is situated some 50km south of Hannover in Lower Saxony. Joining the association which has been running since 1984 is highly recommended and I now realise that we (my wife and I) should have joined the association much sooner than we actually did. To help you decide I would like to share with you my particular story of becoming a member. My experiences with the Yate Twinning Association began in 2009 when we were asked by a very good friend and member of the association if we would like to accompany the group as guests on a trip to the Belgian Christmas Markets in Bruges. On the day of the trip and shortly after boarding the coach, we were pleasantly surprised when we were served fresh tea and coffee and no sooner was the tea and coffee finished the sound of several loud honks from an old bicycle horn signalled it was time to be served a snifter from a choice of schnapps, this delightful procedure was repeated several times throughout the trip. For those not wishing to have schnapps there was bottled water and fruit juices etc. We later realised that this was a welcome and most enjoyable custom on all the group's coach trips.

It was on the return trip from Bruges that we were first asked if we would like to join the Twinning Group and although we had enjoyed ourselves very much and made many new friends we were nervous about our lack of ability to speak or communicate in German. In discussions we were told language was not a problem as nearly all the German people speak very good English although at this time we still felt a little uncomfortable regarding this particular issue. In 2011 we again joined the group on their next Christmas Markets trip to Liège. Aachen and the amazing Caves at Valkenburg, again the matter of joining the group was raised and this time we agreed, quickly signed the relevant pieces of paper and paid our small subscription.

In August 2012 we joined around 25 others from the group on their biennial visit to Bad-Salzdetfurth, due to distance and time pressures we crossed the channel by Eurotunnel with overnight stays in Antwerp on the outward journey and Cologne on the return, the overnight stops were all clean and comfortable 3\* hotels from well know international chains. At 6pm the next day our Bakers Dolphin coach arrived at the prearranged meeting place the small railway station (Bahnhof) at Bad Salzdetfurth where we were greeted by our hosts. As this was our first experience we didn't really know what to expect and perhaps more importantly what they expected from us, however after much hugging, kissing and hand shaking we were quickly made to feel really welcome and already part of the town and its people. Unloading of all the various

bags and suitcases from the coach then took place and as most were staying with families from previous visits they were quickly partnered with their respective hosts. As newcomers we were kindly hosted by a wonderful couple called Reinhard and Veronika who lived a short distance away in a small village called Gros Dungen. Reinhard and Veronika made us very welcome indeed and had taken great care to ensure our very comfortable room had everything we may need including the small things like bottled water and tissues. My wife requires a Gluten Free diet and Veronika had already ensured that all our meals with them would be suitable for her.
